Minutes of Portland Friends Monthly Meeting December 4, 2011

Portland Friends Meeting gathered in meeting for worship to conduct business on December 4, 2011 at 9 a.m., with 19 members and attenders present. We began in silent worship, during which Co-Clerk Tom Antonik read the Twelfth Query from Faith and Practice concerning Peace and Reconciliation. It begins, "Do you 'live in the virtue of that life and power that takes away the occasion of all wars'?"

- 1. Clerk's Comments. Co-Clerk Tom Antonik noted it was his last Meeting for Business and expressed gratitude for the opportunity to serve, and especially for the opportunity to see all the members of our community contributing in large and small ways. He remembered an experience of a few years ago where he was to give a speech during the holidays and prayed for inspiration. God's answer was to highlight dust bunnies in his apartment with bright sunlight. Tom viewed this answer as an illustration of how God is present in ordinary moments as well as in the more dramatic experiences of life. For him, the greatest lesson from Clerking has been setting aside his own personal agenda in favor of listening to the spirit of the Meeting.
- 2. We found the minutes of our November meeting to be in good order.
- **3. Treasurer's Report.** Treasurer Kathy Beach reported that we are eleven months, or 92% into the budget year. Income for November was \$3,653.33, so that year-to-date income stands at \$47,796.63 or 67% of budget. November expenses were \$4,274.02 so that year-to-date expenses are \$60,359.91, or 85% of budget, resulting in a November shortfall of \$-620.69 and year-to date shortfall of \$-12,563.28. Friends accepted the report.

Proposed 2012 budget. In regard to the proposed 2012 budget, Tom Tracy for Financial Oversight Committee characterized it as conservative because of experience over the past two years. Kathy pointed out differences from the 2011 budget:-- that we will be paying off more of the expenses of renovating our kitchen, expecting a lower amount of donations, raising rental income and taking slightly more out of our endowment income. The Clerk reminded any committee clerks who have not made their requests for the 2012 budget to Financial Oversight to do so immediately.

Friends discussed aspects of the proposed budget, as well as the support of this Meeting for endeavors outside our operating budget such as the charities supported by the Easter Breakfast, the Friends School, the Salt and Light conference and many more. A request was made to raise the amount of scholarship money for adults in line 32. A question was raised about the possible impact of further expenses for our water and sewer connection upon the operating budget. At the moment, the street widening project is on hold for the winter. The Clerk pointed out it is expected that any need for funds for these connections will be taken care of out of the Barbie Potter endowment and, if necessary, fundraising targeted at the project.

The draft budget was then referred back to Financial Oversight to consider and present again at Meeting for Business in January 2012. Friends thanked the Committee for their careful attention to balancing our needs against our abilities in these difficult times.

Closing the 2011 gap. The committee urges Friends to donate promptly and generously to cover the large gap before December 31, the end of 2011 budget year. They also encourage members and attenders to adopt regular periodic giving through automatic bank account payments or monthly and quarterly pledges.

- **4. Nominating Committee.** Chris Beach presented a written report for the Committee and thanked the many people who are continuing in their service for the Meeting. He then named people starting in new positions in 2012, and highlighted the areas where there are still needs. These will be filled by sign-ups and personal contact by Nominating Committee members. After discussion, corrections and additions, Friends approved the report.
- **5. Ministry and Counsel.** Kate Potter reported on our new website and thanked all who contributed to creating and maintaining it. They are Jenny Doughty, Rich Nagel, Sarah Cushman, Arthur Fink, Tony Scilipoti, Brad Bussiere-Nichols and others. Co-Clerk Muriel Allen is finding that calls of inquiry about the Meeting have stopped since the website became available.

Ministry and Counsel Committee has received the transfer of membership of Emily Renschler and her two children from Solebury Meeting in Bucks County, Pennsylvania, and recommend the transfer to this Meeting. Her son William Scoll attends the Friends School. There is also a daughter Francesca. Friends approved the transfer of membership of Emily Renschler, William Scoll and Francesca Scoll to Portland Friends Meeting.

Kate Potter and Jenny Doughty are planning a Christmas Eve service at 5 p.m. and welcome others to help them plan and carry out this service.

PFM's new Peace Garden

"And the work of righteousness shall be peace; and the effect of righteousness quietness and assurance for ever." Isaiah 32:17

The new shrub and flower garden at the right end of the meeting house has been designed to honor the Friends' Peace Testimony. To reflect this, all of the shrubs and flowers in the garden have been selected to bloom in white, symbolizing peace. An exception are the native to Maine evergreen junipers forming a base and which bear blue berries.

The shrubs will rise in height from the low growing Juniperis 'Bar Harbor' horizontalis in the front to the tall Spiraea 'Snowmound' at the rear. Species have all been selected for height, as well as for fragrance (Philadelphis 'Blizzard' & Azalea 'White Lightning'), long blooming (Potentilla 'Abbotswood'), foliage interest (Spiraea Birchleaf & Azalea Delaware Valley White), and hardiness. Interspersed along the front will be groups of white flowering Allium Neapolitanum bulbs and Hosta 'Patriot' perennials. The plantings are shown on the drawing and chart display in

the rear hallway of the meetinghouse, and are drawn to show their mature size.

Twelve shrubs and numerous spring-flowering bulbs were planted in the fall of 2011. In the spring of 2012 the planting will be completed with the addition of seven more shrubs, and additional bulbs and perennials. The exact spring species will be dependent on nursery availability.

One non-white flower specie, the hybrid tea rose Rosa 'Madame A. Meilland' 'Peace', with its light yellow-cream coloration touched with crimson-pink, will be planted in the spring. With its tenderness in our local horticultural Zone 5, it is hoped that a regular maintenance schedule during spring and fall meetinghouse cleanup days will sustain these flowers. This can remind us that Peace has to be nurtured.



After WWII, Field Marshal Alan Brooke was asked to lend his name to the rose but declined, saying a more enduring name would be 'Peace'. The Peace rose was given to each delegation at the first meeting of the United Nations, with a note which read:

"We hope the 'Peace' rose will influence men's thoughts for everlasting world peace."

New Racial Justice Curriculum for Young Friends: Training Workshop and Networking Opportunity, Jan 14

with Lisa Graustein, Wellesley Friends Meeting Saturday, January 14, 9:30am-3:30pm, Coffee & tea at 9am 26 Benvenue Street, Wellesley, MA

Lisa Graustein has put together a Racial Justice Curriculum to be used with Young Friends groups and is looking for people to teach it this spring.

In this free workshop, Lisa will orient and train RE teachers and other adults to use the curriculum with their YF groups. The curriculum is flexible, designed for 10, 45-minute sessions or 5, 90-minute sessions and for small or large groups. It gives Young Friends experience in:

- exploring their own racial and ethnic identity;
- developing tools for understanding how race, white privilege and racism impact our daily lives;
- · learning some of the racial history of NEYM Friends;
- exploring issues of race and racism among Friends or within their geographic community; and
- · developing skills for interrupting racism in their daily lives.

The workshop will be an experiential walk-through of the curriculum, covering most of the key activities. It will also be a chance to meet other youth workers and share ideas, resources, and build community. The curriculum will be available on-line and anyone teaching it will have the chance to be in touch with others teaching the curriculum or addressing similar issues with Young Friends.

Please bring a brown bag lunch and any books, films, or other resources that you can recommend on this topic for our resources table.

This is a free workshop, but please let us know you will be joining us so we may plan accordingly.
