- 3. Financial Report

Treasurer Kathy Beach gave the financial report. The Treasurer's Report includes numbers for both June and July because our summer meeting is on the last day of this month.

Both adults and children will be able to attend NEYM sessions and summer camps due to our support of camperships and scholarships for adults needing assistance.

In June our Meeting contributions went to the City of Portland and the Maine Council of Churches. In July we contributed to the Quaker Ridge

Building Fund and Preble Street Soup Kitchen. Friends donated generously to Grace Uwimana for her educational needs.

Our balance for the month of June was (-\$1254). The balance for July was \$566. This gives us a balance for the year of (-\$6167). Thanks were expressed to all who contributed.

4. Ministry and Counsel Report

* Wedding of Colin and Rania Campbell-Bussiere.

Lise Wagner read the following minute: "On Twenty-fourth Day, Seventh Month, 2016, a called meeting for worship for marriage was held at Broadturn Farm in Scarborough, Maine, under the care of Portland Friends Meeting (Portland, Maine). Rania Campbell-Cobb and Colin Bussiere-Nichols exchanged vows to be loving and faithful before a large gathering of family and friends, including over 20 members and attenders of Portland Friends Meeting as well as friends from Guilford College and West Philadelphia Worship Group.

Sweet and loving vocal ministry, often tinged with tears of joy, broke the blessed silence. Friends spoke of Colin and Rania's very long relationship, with agreement that it was "about time!" The couple's faith, deep love for each other and their community, and commitment to social justice through teaching and farming, were described by those who love them. The outdoor setting on the farm where Rania once worked, with butterflies overhead adding to the color of the gathering, was the perfect spot for the couple deeply rooted in nature and joined in love.

After the period of worship concluded, the Oversight Committee and parents signed the certificate, followed by each guest. And the mystery of the many hyphens was solved with the reading of the certificate: the couple will now be known as Rania and Colin Campbell-Bussiere. "

The meeting then realized that several marriages had gone unminuted, and Lea Sutton offered to research, along with Lise Wagner, how minutes could be incorporated into our historical records in retrospect.

- * World Quaker Day is October 2nd. Dorothy Grannell reminded us that this is only the third annual World Quaker Day. This year's theme is "Inspired by Faith witnessing together in the world." They are asking every yearly meeting to consider a minute of sustainability, many of whose themes are things that many meetings have already done. However, arriving at a unified agreement among yearly meetings is new. The videos and presentations show how yearly meetings with differing theological views have nonetheless arrived at agreement about how to approach the problem of sustainability. It was agreed that we would show these at the rise of meeting for worship after the October business meeting.

Part-Time Aftercare Teacher Early Childhood

Friends School of Portland is seeking a patient, caring individual to serve as the Early Childhood Lead in our Aftercare Program. This person must have ample experience working with children ages 3-6 years old. Experience could include camp



counseling, babysitting, coaching, volunteer work, etc. Majors in Education are preferred, but not required. Ideally the applicant aligns with the Quaker values of simplicity, peace, integrity, community, equality, and stewardship, as these are the cornerstones of our school and the Aftercare Program.

As the EC Lead you will be responsible for helping with snack set-up and delivery, as well as general support and supervision of children during free play time. The EC Lead will be supported by a very seasoned assistant, FSP's physical education teacher. Responsibilities will also include attending a weekly meeting with other Aftercare faculty members. Friends School of Portland works on an academic calendar beginning with faculty days on August 29 (including a mandatory Aftercare Faculty meeting); the year ends on June 9.

This is a part-time position, Monday-Thursday 3:00-5:30pm and Friday 1:45-5:30pm at the rate of \$13.50 per hour. There are no benefits with this position. We are seeking applicants who can make a commitment for the entire school year.

The annual gathering has traditionally brought together War Tax resisters and potential War Tax resisters from most of the NE states to provide support for one another and encourage non-resisters to learn more about WTR.

As our country struggles with the consequences of militarism here and elsewhere, including killing of Black residents, militarized police, terrorism and war, we need to expand our conversations to include others involved in challenging all aspects of this structure.

A special feature of this year's gathering will be a Saturday gathering of activists involved in a various forms of resistance to hear **Mandy Carter** and participate in a round table discussion about the challenges we all face, the strategies for change, and to deepen the intersectionality of our struggles. Our hope is that this dialogue could spark a joint effort for a larger, broader conference on WTR and Resistance in 2017 in conjunction with the Resistance Studies Initiative at UMass, Amherst.

Mandy Carter is a southern African-American lesbian social justice activist with a 47-year movement history of social, racial and LGBT justice organizing. Mandy has been on the staff of two War Resisters League regional offices and the national coordinator of the Bayard Rustin 2013 Commemoration Project of the National Black Justice Coalition. She lives in Durham, North Carolina, where she co-founded Southerners On New Ground (SONG), building transformative models of organizing in the South that connect race, class, culture, gender, ability, sexual orientation, and gender identity.

Free Online Course — Radical Spirituality: the Early History of the Quakers

Learn about the beginnings of this radical religious group as it emerged in 17th century England, with this free online course: https://www.futurelearn.com/courses/quakers/1

When you think of the Quakers, it might bring to mind porridge oats, or pacifism, or perhaps prison reform. But there is much much more to the Quakers than any of these things.

Through this course, we will be finding out about what lies at the heart of Quaker beginnings, who its main characters were, and how in a few weeks during the summer of 1652 the Quaker movement was formed in the north of England.



Explore exactly where the Quakers started — Almost from nothing, the Quakers were to become the most successful sect of the 1650s and 1% of the population of England were to become Quakers. It was a radical spirituality which appealed to thousands of people, hungry for new ways of thinking.

In this three week course, we will see how the events of 1652 unfolded and visit the key sites of Pendle Hill, Firbank Fell, and Swarthmoor Hall in the northwest of England. Each of these places marks a critical piece of the dramatic story of May and June 1652.
